Use this monthly tip to help improve your practice and keep your patients safe!



Dental Unit Waterlines: Part 2

Last month we talked about testing, another important step in safe waterlines is your maintenance plan. There are many different systems out there to chose from, while they're all different, you should chose one that works for your staff and equipment. Here are some maintenance tips to keep your water safe:

- A solid maintenance plan can help prevent biofilm growth in waterlines
- A chemical disinfectant should be added to the water before it enters the lines in your dental unit to keep bacteria out of the water
- Dental waterlines should be flushed for 2 minutes at the beginning of every day and 20-30 seconds between patients
- Chemical shock treatments should be done regularly, according to manufacturer instructions, to destroy any biofilm that may have formed
- Water bottles should be emptied at the end of every day and water should be purged from the dental lines to prevent stagnation
- Unused waterlines on a unit are a high risk area for biofilm growth, make sure these lines are flushed, shocked and purged with the rest of the lines
